Grant schemes relevant to allotment projects

Please note that grant schemes go out of date very quickly. This list was compiled in August 2011 and should be read alongside the fact sheet *An Introduction to Grants*.

Sources of public funding or government grants

Landfill Communities Fund

Guidelines for the scheme stipulate that allotments are excluded 'since they are used by individuals, not the general public'. However, a number of allotment associations have secured some funding for activities that provide a public amenity (e.g. wildlife gardens, community composting, community building).

Projects seeking funding must be within 10 miles of an active landfill site. The most common way to receive funding is through

an organisation which distributes funds on behalf of landfill operators, known as a Distributive Environmental Body (DEB). A list of DEBs throughout the UK can be found on ENTRUST's website, along with application forms and guidance.

Coalfields Regeneration Trust

Gives funding to projects that contribute to the regeneration of coalfields communities. Gives grants up to £5,000 in England and Scotland (up to £10,000 in Wales) for projects that can be completed within 12 months. Also gives large grants of up to £200,000 to bigger voluntary, community and statutory organisations.

Grants from companies and local businesses

Many large companies have made a commitment to and will support projects in their local area or in their field of activities.

Some businesses choose to support a local charity, sponsor a local event, or encourage employees to volunteer for community activities and give them paid time off for this. For example, HSS the Hire Company offer discounted hire rates to all registered charities and community projects and have provided over £250,000 of free hire in the last 2 years. www.hsshiregroup.com/csr
